I was reminded the other day about a book I read a few years ago and am now reading again. It is "Life Together" by Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

In it he wrote, "The body is the proper metaphor for the Christian community. We are members of a body, not only when we choose to be, but in our whole existence. Every member serves the whole body, either to its health or to its destruction. This is a spiritual reality." Heady but such true words. Bonhoeffer goes on to write, "A Christian Fellowship lives and exists by the intercession of its members for one another, or (without intercession) it collapses."

In other words, if we hold up others to the throne of God, being an intercessor in their behalf, those we pray for will feel your love, your commitment, and experience the power and majesty of God! They will know they are not alone and will be strengthened.

It comes down to, as my friend pointed out, "when we learn to suffer and rejoice with each other, we will visibly display what we are- 'the body of Christ.'" Martin Luther said about the church; "The body of Christ is what God is using for the healing of humanity."

I wanted to pass this on to each of you. We are truly a part of His body. I have seen you weep. I have seen you cry tears of joy. Not only for ourselves, but even strangers. I pray for you each day, and thank God for bringing us together, not just as a congregation, but a loving and caring fellowship, a wonderful part of the "Body of Christ."
