Have you ever tried to get away with something... and then think you did... only to find out... you didn't? Well, in my 9th grade science class, I thought I did.

Early at home that morning, I remembered that there was to be a test. And as normal, I forgot to study. I can still see myself writing out answers on small strips of paper in our living room. It was the first class of the day. I sat down, pulled our my "cheat sheets" and filled in the answers. I was so proud of myself that I even "missed" a couple to make my test score more believable. I turned in the test, the teacher smiled, and I walked down the hall to my next class. All was right with the world... until...

A friend of mine caught up with me in the hall and said that someone in the class saw me cheating and told the teacher. Que the absolute feeling of doom! I was caught! Placed in an unescapable barrier! No where to turn! Let's just say, the rest of my day was not pleasant. What should I do? I was a good student. This was the first (and only) time I tried anything like this. I realized God would not allow me to get away with cheating and He gave me a guilty conscience to push me to make a decision... and that decision was to confess.

David describes a time of confession in his life. He tells God, "When I kept silent, my bones wasted away... for day and night, Your hand was heavy on me...but then I acknowledged my sin to You." Psalm 32: 3-5

At 8 o'clock that evening, feeling much like David described, I called my teacher and told him what I had done. He first thanked me for coming forward. Then he said he knew, and that he was prepared to fail me for the entire period. But then he said that I could retake the test, verbally with him. Then whatever score was made would be reduced by one grade. I cannot begin to tell you the sheer relief I felt to have the burden of guilt lifted off my shoulders. And of course, the new respect I now had for my teacher. So, what happened?

Truth matters to God. We are to confess our sins to Him and to ask forgiveness to those we have wronged. David finished verse 5 by saying, "You forgave the guilt of my sin." You need to know that I paid the penalty for what I did. Believe me when I tell you that my bones ached and God's hand was very heavy on me. But then He forgave me, and so did my teacher. And when I finished taking the test, I truly felt that all was again, right with the world!
